What encouraged you to join the Judiciary?

I wanted to fully play a part in all the areas I could in the legal system, so in crime both prosecuting and defending and sitting as a judge. I sit in the Crown Court and General Regulatory Chamber and I believe I am a better lawyer and advocate as I make decisions as a judge and look at things from all perspectives. I also really wanted to represent my heritage and community as a Muslim Pakistani Punjabi Woman on the Bench as I feel I bring a wider experience and voice and my presence I hope is a symbol of increasing judicial diversity.

What have you learnt about yourself recently?

To work harder at savouring each day as it comes. Homeschooling and remote hearings/conferences/paperwork have sured up my time management skills, and patience. What do you think are the differences/similarities in the skill set required to being a good judge and a good barrister?

Both require acting with fairness, a dedicated work ethic, using sensibly your analytical skills, working independently but also as a team and the ability to engage and be understood by all around you. How are they different? As a Judge I am in charge of the court and I must ensure everyone is treated fairly and with respect, and is allowed to play their proper part. Drafting and delivering a summing up is a separate skill set as is knowing you must decide and rule and impose a sentence. It is a much wider responsibility.
